Brief History:

The Western Algebraic Geometry Seminar traces back its origin to the Utah-UCLA Algebraic Geometry Seminar started in 1989 by H. Clemens, D. Gieseker, M. Green, J. Kollár, and R. Lazarsfeld. However, as senior figures moved east, the original WAGS faded away.

In 2002, WAGS was resurrected by none other than Aaron Bertram, who with the later partnership of Ravi Vakil from Stanford University has been the driving force behind this successful semi-annual meeting of algebraic geometers in the western half of the United States and Canada.

WAGS in Utah:

Since 2002, 3 WAGS meetings have been held in Utah. The latest one was on 3-4 December last year, organized by Aaron Bertram, Christopher Hacon and myself. I thought that was a successful meeting scientifically, judging from the comments I received from various participants. In fact, I personally learned a lot from the lectures. Aaron was the last speaker of the conference and gave a terrific talk on his joint work with Daniele Arcara.

There is another aspect about this special WAGS: It was held in honor of the retirement of Jim Carrell from UBC, who has been a friend of algebraic geometry at Utah and cofounded the Pacific NW Geometry Seminar. Therefore some special planning had been made before the meeting. Several lectures were directly related to Jim's research, but no posters were made public before the conference. On the first day, when Jim saw the poster in the meeting, he was very pleasantly surprised (and he thanked us during the morning coffee break.) Then Sándor Kovács (Univ. of Washington) was asked to make some remarks regarding Jim's contributions to mathematics and mathematical community before beginning the last talk of the day. A giant poster featuring Jim's picture was presented to him after Sándor's speech. At 18:30 most participants gathered in the East-West Connection Restaurant for the conference banquet. A cake was delivered to Jim during the dinner, with the dedication "Jim Carrell, Mathematician and Friend", and he was asked to make a speech. Jim was rather moved. He thanked the organizers and took pictures of the cake and the poster to share with his wife.
