1.5: 34, 36, 38, 41: *modeling and solving problems with first order linear DE's. (These problems are carried over from last week.)*

w3.1) In problem 23, use dfield to plot the differential equation slope field for $0 \leq t \leq 3$ and $-50 \leq x \leq 250$. Use the dfield option which lets you specify initial values in order to add the graph of the solution to the IVP in 23, along with the graphs of the two equilibrium solutions. Notice that as you move your mouse over the dfield plot, its location is tracked by the dfield applet. Use your mouse to find the time when the solution to the IVP in 23 satisfies $x(t) = 100$, and record this information. Print out a copy of your plot; add the coordinates of this intersection point at which $x = 100$. Is the t - coordinate of this point consistent with your work in 23b?

equilibria, stability, phase portraits, slope fields for autonomous first order DE's:

w3.2) Consider the differential equation

$$\frac{dx}{dt} = -x^4 + 9x^2.$$

- a) Find the equilibria; draw the phase portrait;
- b) classify the equilibria as stable, asymptotically stable, or unstable (possibly one-sided stable);
- c) use dfield to sketch the slope field and representative solution graphs, including the graphs of the equilibrium solutions, to verify your phase portrait analysis. Include this plot in your homework.
